Many display organisers wore traditional costumes and there were displays of local produce from each of Chile's regions. While geology and geo-artefacts were on show culture and traditions played a significant role in the displays. Then there was the launch of the weaving display. Amazing that most UNESCO Global Geoparks were represented.

## Reflections – final day of the 11<sup>th</sup> UNSECO Global Geoparks Conference in chile

12 September 2025

Yesterday took in the field tours. I chose the visit to an Indigenous village where we were welcomed into their community with an excellent luncheon and tour of the Auracaria forest near their village. The Welcome included an outline of the Indigenous Mapuche community background and their endeavours to retain the forests for their use, and to stop logging. The seeds are used for a variety of foods including roasted seeds, flour for bread and pastes. Following lunch, we were taken on a guided walk in the snow, stopping at selected places for explanations of their use of "pinon" nut, seeds from the Auracaria trees, it is an amazing industry.

The last day was taken up with Workshops where GGN wanted input to several concepts including Indigenous engagement, and branding. There were forums on climate change, geological heritage and geodiversity, gastronomy and education. I chose the Indigenous Workshop followed by the Branding Workshop (for GGN).

In the background the GGN continued its administrative meetings as part of their approvals processes for new and revalidation of geoparks, planning and annual general meetings. One day, we, that is Australia, might once again participate ... when we achieve our UNESCO Global Geoparks.
